Born in 1907, Basil Wyatt was originally trained as a bricklayer by his father. He then went on to work as a foreman for a large well-known local firm and became known for his keen eye for detail.

After the war he decided he wanted to work independently and in 1956 he founded the family-owned company on the principles of building strong relationships with clients and delivering quality construction.

When the company was first formed Basil worked out of the back of a garage on Sunderland Avenue in Oxford. From

these humble beginnings he was able to build up a strong local client base - including Oxford City Council - and an excellent reputation for the quality of his work.

The company continued to grow from strength to strength throughout the 1960s, and in 1972, Basil's son David joined the company. David had previously studied Construction Management and worked as a regional surveyor for Wates Ltd.

In 1974 Basil and David decided it was time to find new premises for the business, which was fast out-growing the 'garage' office. They moved to 29 Harpes Rd in Summertown, Oxford - which is where the company is still located today.

In the years prior to the move, 29 Harpes Rd had been used by a 'rag and bone' man collecting unwanted clothes, household items etc (an early form of recycling!) and later as a joiner's yard before becoming Basil Wyatt & Sons' main office.

The offices have seen many changes over the past 40 plus years and although the address remains the same, the

premises themselves are near to unrecognisable. They have been refurbished a number of times – most recently in 2015 – to accommodate changes in how business is managed and run today.

In those early years there were no computers, photocopiers or mobile photos and up until 1980 everything had to be carefully hand-written in a log book (David has kept the log book as a piece of family nostalgia - see below).

David has continued to honour his father's founding principles and has worked on many prestigious construction projects during the last three decades throughout Oxfordshire and its surrounding counties.

Some project highlights include restoring the last untouched Grade II listed Victorian theatre in Teddington; building the first purpose-built homes in Oxfordshire for autistic adults; building an Egyptian-inspired house in the Oxfordshire countryside; refurbishing what was once the Cheltenham residence of Sir Walter Scott; refurbishing two iconic Oxfam shops in Oxford - one of the first Oxfam shops - as well as the first Oxfam specialist bookshop.

In 2016 David's eldest daughter Kate joined the company as Business Development Manager - taking the company into its third generation.

Kate has experience working for both large and small construction companies including Wates and Gleeds. She has also worked in the US but chose to bring her skills and experience back to Oxford to work for the family company.
